## **Nursing Department Application Admissions Index Entrance Requirements Fall 2007**

This information has been provided to allow students a better understanding of the admissions process for the Fall 2007 Columbia Basin College Nursing Application.

The Columbia Basin College Nursing Department utilizes three elements for entrance into the Nursing Program. Those elements include (A) cumulative grade point average among selected prerequisite courses, (B) pre-nursing assessment score, and (C) departmental course completion score index. Each of these elements is outlined further below. These three elements will be combined for a total **Nursing Department Admissions Index Score** based on a total point value of 30 points.

### **A. Cumulative Grade Point**

The cumulative grade point of the following courses will be calculated for the entrance index score.

1. College chemistry or one year of high school chemistry within the last 5 years
2. Biology 221 and 221.1 (Anatomy and Physiology I)
3. College math over 100
4. English 101 (English Composition)

The cumulative GPA (from a total possible cumulative score of 4.0) will be multiplied by a factor of 2.5 for 10 total possible points. In the disciplines of chemistry and math, the highest graded course within the transcript will be utilized for calculating the Cumulative Grade Point.

Letter grades (including those received from transferring colleges or universities) will be assigned the following decimal scores according to our campus policy:

A = 4.0, A- = 3.7, B+ = 3.3, B = 3.0, B- = 2.7, C+ = 2.3, C = 2.0, C- = 1.7, D+ = 1.3, D = 1.0, D- = 0.7

### **B. Pre-Nursing Assessment Score**

The Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) pre-nursing assessment score will be utilized to assess math, English, and science comprehension at the time of application. The assessment will be provided through the Columbia Basin College Assessment Center based on student demand and independent scheduling. Results will be forwarded to the Admissions office for placement of score results within respective student files. This test may be taken twice in the year prior to application to the Nursing department. The highest score per application period will be used for computation of the Nursing Department Admissions Index Score. The total pre-nursing TEAS score (from a total possible score of 100) will be divided by a factor of 10 for 10 total possible points. The test will be provided at specific times throughout the academic year, primarily in Fall quarter. Please contact either the Nursing department or the Assessment Center for test availability dates.

TEAS Study Guides can be purchased from the Columbia Basin College Bookstore. You can also obtain a study guide from "www.atitesting.com" for \$25.00 + \$8.00 Shipping/Handling. This study guide is written by the same people who produce the TEAS test.

Cost of the TEAS test is \$40.00

### C. Departmental Course Completion Score

The departmental course completion score is a cumulative score based on the total number of non-nursing courses completed by an individual student. This score is calculated to include Winter quarter 2007 classes (or Fall semester classes where appropriate). The courses and their score are provided below: (Please note: for transfer courses, a transcript evaluation must be completed by the Registrar's office at Columbia Basin College prior to the calculation of the Departmental Course Completion Score. Transfer courses will not be assigned a point value until the official transcript evaluation has been completed.)

The departmental course completion score (from a total possible score of 23) will be divided by a factor of 2.3 for 10 total possible points.

The total Nursing Department Admissions Index Score, including the three elements outlined above will total no more than 30 points. When the student makes application to the department, the Admissions Index Score will be computed and recorded for class cohort comparison. Those students with the top Admissions Index Scores (based on the total number of new admissions allowed in a given year) will be admitted to the Nursing department.

The Nursing Department Admissions Index Score helps to provide equity among student applicants. Overall, the Nursing Department Admissions Index Score computation provides a dynamic index of comparison for students applying to the Columbia Basin College Nursing department.



## Nursing Department Program Alternatives

All students who enter as nursing students must meet the minimum entrance requirements for nursing. Students who satisfactorily complete the first quarter and continue in the Nursing program, are qualified to seek employment as a nursing assistant.

At the end of the first three quarters, three alternatives are available for students who have successfully completed previous required course work. Each alternative has minimal prerequisites for entry.

- Alternative One: Student may register for the summer session curriculum to complete a program which leads to eligibility to write the State Board Examination for licensure as a Practical Nurse and exit at the end of the summer season.

*Prerequisite: Student must have completed the first three quarters of the Nursing program at Columbia Basin College, or equivalent, and all required courses must have a grade of 2.0 or above.*

- Alternative Two: Student may register for the summer session curriculum to complete a program which leads to eligibility to write the State Board Examination for licensure as a Practical Nurse and may register for the second year.

*Prerequisite: Student must have completed the first three quarters of the Nursing program at Columbia Basin College, or equivalent, with a cumulative G.P.A of 2.5 in required nursing courses. All required support courses must have a grade of 2.0 or above. Space priority is given in the summer session to those not eligible to go on to the second year.*

- Alternative Three: Student may register for fall quarter of the second year of the Nursing program. Successful completion of the second year leads to eligibility to write the State Board Examination for licensure as a Registered Nurse. Graduates of this program will receive the Associate in Applied Science Nursing degree.

*Prerequisite: Student must have completed the first three quarters of the Nursing program at Columbia Basin College, or equivalent, with a cumulative GPA of 2.5 in required nursing courses. All required support courses must have a grade of 2.0 or above.*



## Nursing Department General Information Prospective Students

Once students have been accepted into the program, the following information will be helpful to guide them with other requirements necessary to maintain enrollment.

1. All students accepted into the program are required to have a health form completed by a licensed physician or certified nurse practitioner. The forms are provided by the College. Please have the form mailed or delivered directly to the Nursing department at Columbia Basin College on or before September 1<sup>st</sup> of the fall quarter the student enters the program.
2. Since several clinical facilities are utilized in the Tri-Cities and surrounding areas, students must furnish their own transportation to facilities.
3. All students are encouraged to have accident/health insurance. A Student Injury & Sickness Insurance plan is available to purchase. Forms are available from the campus cashier's office.
4. All students are required to have malpractice insurance. The policy must be purchased at the College at the time of registration.
5. Student study requirements have been found to be a minimum of three hours per week for each scheduled theory credit hour.
6. Membership in the CBC Association of Student Nurses is strongly encouraged. Cost for membership is \$5.00 per year.
7. Scholarships and loans for nursing students are available through the Financial Aid office. For more information contact that office and review the [www.columbiabasin.edu](http://www.columbiabasin.edu) website.
8. To be licensed as a Practical Nurse or Registered Nurse, graduates must pass State Board licensure exams. This is at the expense of the graduate. Questions about licensure exams should be directed to the Nursing Program Coordinator.
9. All students must have a **current CPR card for Health Care Provider including adults, children and infants** for the duration of enrollment in the Nursing program. Immunizations must also be updated. Current immunization guidelines will be provided once accepted into the Nursing program.
10. All students must successfully complete required prerequisites each quarter to remain in the Nursing program.



## **Nursing Department Physical Attributes of the Nursing Profession**

Students planning on entering the nursing program need to be aware that the following physical requirements are expected by employers. Therefore, students will be expected to meet the same standards during clinical/lab instruction in the Nursing program. Inability to meet these requirements will cause the student to fail clinical courses.

1. Using good body mechanics, lift/carry a minimum of 25 lbs. independently and 50 lbs. with assistance.
2. Requires normal/corrected vision and hearing to normal range.
3. Intermittent sitting, standing, stooping and walking. Full range of motion is required.
4. Requires good manual and finger dexterity.
5. Must be able to differentiate odors in the clinical setting.
6. Communication Skills: Must be able to read and write in English. Must be able to communicate verbally in English both in person and on the telephone.
7. May be required to stand on carpeting, linoleum, or be seated at a standard desk at the nurse's station using an office chair for a varying amount of time (i.e. 2-4 hours).
8. Must be able to delegate tasks and work in fast-paced facilities.

**General Job Description:**

The nursing student is responsible for performing patient assessment, planning care delivery, performing nursing interventions and teaching patients and family members about the medical conditions. This includes reviewing the patient's chart, following physician's orders, determining appropriate treatment, providing medication, assessing the patient's current medical condition, complaints and concerns and communicating this information to the healthcare team. The student will also be assisting with meals, positioning, transferring and walking. Direct care includes, but is not limited to, administering medications, completing the nursing procedures such as catheterization, suctioning and dressing changes and responding to emergencies as they occur.

**Machines, tools, or moving equipment:**

Will use a variety of medical supplies and equipment to include: stethoscope, blood pressure cuff, medications, PCA machine, IV poles, tubing and pumps, CPM machine, syringes, patient support bars, hospital bed etc.

**Percent of time spent:**

Standing and walking are both frequent and alternating for the entire work day. Occasional sitting is possible when taking patients' history or recording on the patient's chart.

**While working the employee must:**

**Working environment:**

There are many settings which the nursing student will experience (i.e. hospital, nursing home, public health, school setting, clinic or consulting role.) The most physically demanding is that indicated above which is in a hospital or nursing home setting. In that environment there is usually a nursing station area with patient rooms surrounding the area. The flooring often varies. This is an active, busy position requiring the ability to keep track of a large number of activities at a time.

Essential functions necessary for this program include the use of the senses to gather information i.e. color changes in the skin, hearing heart and lung sounds through a stethoscope, palpating pulses and feeling heat/cold skin. It will also require the use of speech, reading and writing to communicate with clients, families, and other health care professionals. It will require the ability to synthesize information from a variety of sources and apply it in making decisions regarding client care. Applicants must have emotional stability and flexibility to function effectively in situations of stress while placing client needs first.

During each shift the nursing students are assigned to perform patient care which includes medication administration and direct care functions. Lifting assistance is usually available for items which are too heavy. This position could be relieved of emergency response duties, but would have to be prepared to administer emergency care if other personnel are not available to do so. ## Nursing Department Program Costs

All stated costs reflect November, 2006 fee schedules. All stated costs are subject to change. However, the following figures may be used as a general guideline to assist applicants in preparing for the costs associated with the nursing enrollment.

### Tuition and Other Costs

1. Tuition - as stated in current schedule; plus approximately \$7 per credit lab fee for each lab class (subject to change).
2. Books - estimate of \$1,300.00 for one-year program and an additional \$500.00 for the second year.
3. Supplies - notebooks, pencils, etc., estimate \$100.00 per quarter.
4. CBC Association of Student Nurses - \$5.00 per year.
5. Student Injury & Sickness Insurance Plan – Approximately \$212 per quarter through Columbia Basin College for students who do not have healthcare insurance. Forms are available from the campus cashier's office.
6. Malpractice Insurance - approximately \$19.00 - \$30.00 per year through Columbia Basin College.
7. Graduation - \$540.00 which includes the fees for State Board examinations costs for each program completed (LPN, RN).
8. Special Examination Fees - approximately \$50.00 per year.
9. Physical Exam and Immunizations – Approximately \$250.00.

### Clinical Costs

Students will need the following items to be used in the clinical area of the extended campus facility:

1. Uniforms - Must be purchased through the approved uniform company(DOVE) – approximate cost is \$85-\$105.
2. Nursing Shoes - Approximately \$60 a pair.
3. Wrist Watch - With a second hand and a band that is waterproof - estimate about \$25.
4. Name Pin - \$1.50 paid for at time of registration.
5. Subscription to a Nursing Journal - \$35 (optional).
6. Stethoscope- \$20 - \$200 (costs vary depending on quality). Students will sometimes sell these during a fundraiser Fall quarter. You may want to wait to purchase this until school has started.
7. Nursing lab equipment bag – approx. \$114.95 (to be purchased at the CBC Bookstore after Fall quarter begins).
8. CBC Nursing Student polo shirt for clinical – approximately \$40.
