<p>Reports Academic End State Monitoring Report</p> <p>GISS</p>	<p><u>Curt Freed, VP-Instruction</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Academic End State is comprised of five separate goals with supporting indicators for each goal. The five goals include: (1) students demonstrate academic progress, (2) effective learning, (3) effective teaching, (4) quality educational programs, and (5) quality support programs.</li> <li>• This year’s assessment of performance on the Academic End State resulted in a “B+” rating, which was considerably higher than previous reporting year’s performance of “C”. A number of improvements were built into this year’s report process, including the initiation of a Core Theme Team composed of faculty members to provide support in identifying appropriate indicators, interpreting results, and identifying ways to improve CBC’s performance in this area. New data sources and new indicators were also integrated into the report. Performance on several indicators was very positive, with 20 of 26 indicators receiving the top rating of “good” and five receiving a rating of “poor”. Only a single indicator was rated as “neutral” in performance.</li> <li>• All of the poor ratings fell in the area of student performance in math. As noted, improvement activities related to math have been completed or are underway.</li> <li>• Trustee Mitchell complimented on a report well done.</li> <li>• Trustee Finke commented on page 11-A7 where Yakima Valley Community College ranks third and CBC is at the other end. Has there been any communication with Yakima on how they’ve attained this ranking? Curt replied that Yakima is participating in the “Achieving the Dream” act.</li> <li>• Also, page 23, wonder what percentage of students do take some type of physical fitness?</li> <li>• Trustee Mitchell, pages 10 &amp; 11, Outcome should be zero (0) instead of two (2). Curt confirmed this is an error on the slide, and it should be a zero (0).</li> <li>• Trustee Finke also referred to page 30, as to why only Central Washington University is listed and not several? Curt replied because of the limited data available, and perhaps a note to that effect should be made.</li> </ul> <p><u>President Cummins</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Meeting with administrative exempt (supervisors/asst. supervisors),</li> </ul>	<p>For a copy of full report contact Lupe Perez.</p>

<p>Education Reform</p>	<p>President's Advisory Council.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Using Gene Holand's innovation to look at Student Services component parts, and working toward recommendations on their remodel. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Agilegrad software will help students develop degree plan with counseling monitoring. Plan to implement mandatory degree plan requirement for students by spring 2012.</li> <li>Coaching pilot underway this quarter, with 300 students participating. FYI teachers staying in touch and continuing as coaches with students. Have received positive feedback. Will capture data at the end of winter quarter.</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p><u>President Cummins</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Governor Gregoire announced an education reform package to replace the Higher Education Coordinating Board when it is abolished effective July 1, 2012. In its place will be the Council for Higher Education. Three bills are being considered for the board's new governance structure.</li> </ul>	
<p>Discussion Naming of Forensic Science Lab</p> <p>Honorary Degrees</p>	<p><u>President Cummins</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Trustee Mitchell noted Board Policy Type: Governance Process GP-7 Naming of Facilities, number 4: Advisory recommendations for awarding the honor pursuant to this policy shall be made by an ad-hoc advisory committee appointed by the Board of Trustees.</li> <li>President Cummins asked for motion by Trustees to set up ad-hoc committee.</li> </ul> <p><u>President Cummins</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><u>RCW 28B.50.140</u> The board, upon recommendation of the faculty, may also confer honorary associate of arts degrees upon persons other than graduates of the community college, in recognition of their learning or devotion to education, literature, art, or science. No degree may be conferred in consideration of the payment of money or the donation of any kind of property.</li> <li>Recommending honorary degrees for the following individuals: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Bernie Vinther – former CBC machine technology student. He did not graduate because of his poor eyesight. Has set up business in machine technology, and his business is hindered because of lack of degree. He is worthy of an honorary AAS degree.</li> <li>John Heaton – brilliant business man who has hired CBC students, and helped build Innovation degree. Support granting him a BAS degree.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<p>Trustee Armijo moved to set up ad-hoc committee for the naming of facilities, Trustee Mitchell seconded. Approved unanimously.</p> <p>Trustees support recommendations and asked President Cummins to proceed.</p>
