BEFORE YOU START

Students must complete an application each year to be considered for entry into this program. The prerequisites for admission are:

Earned associate degree in a health science, first responder, or social sciences related field

OR

Successful completion of a minimum of 90 credits of coursework required of the BAS in Community Health degree.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

CBC's Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) in Community Health program prepares graduates for work in community health and related fields. Community health workers are frontline public health workers who are trusted members of and/or have an unusually close understanding of the community served. Community health workers have gained the attention of policy makers and healthcare providers because of their unique competence in not only understanding community needs but also gaining trust in ways that the traditional healthcare workforce may not. These attributes enable community health workers to address the social determinants of health where the healthcare system may fall short due to lack of time, skills, cultural affinity, and community linkages.

OUT OF CLASS TO DO'S

National Background Search & Drug Screen Requirements

As part of the admission requirements for Health Science programs, applicants must successfully pass a criminal background check and drug screen prior to working with patients in clinical areas. The background check and drug screen are paid by the student and administered through a third party company, CastleBranch. In addition to the background check required by CBC, each clinical facility reserves the right to conduct its own criminal background check prior to allowing a student to enter its health care facilities for clinical participation.

Certain criminal convictions, pending charges, or negative actions may automatically disqualify a person from having unsupervised access to vulnerable adults, juveniles and children. Clinical facilities reserve the right to accept or decline a student's placement in its facility.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

While community health workers have diverse industry job titles, their scope of work may include:

- Discussing health concerns with members of the community.
- Providing informational counseling and social support.
- Helping people understand their health conditions.
- Translating or interpreting health information for clients.
- Organizing outreach programs.
- Advocating for individual and community health needs.
- Collecting data and report findings to healthcare providers.
- Providing health screenings, referrals, and educational materials.

Length of Program

Total length of the program is typically 4 years (two years for prerequisite courses and two years of Community Health coursework).
