ABOUT THE PROGRAM

When you enroll in the Anthropology program at Columbia Basin College (CBC), you'll study humans in the past and presentday to gain an understanding of human behavior patterns and a wider perspective on the world. Anthropologists strive to understand humans from a cultural and biological perspective. A central concern of today's anthropologists is applying their knowledge to find solutions to human problems.

Anthropology is typically divided into four categories:

- Sociocultural Anthropology
- Biological/Physical Anthropology
- Archaeology
- Linguistic Anthropology

Anthropologists often integrate the perspectives of several of these areas into their research, teaching, and professional lives. When you enroll in Anthropology classes at CBC, you'll develop an understanding of human biological and sociocultural evolution through writing, research, and critical thinking.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

There are many possible careers related to the study of anthropology:

• Education

You could teach and conduct research on college campuses. Many university departments or programs have a demand for anthropologists.

• Corporations and Business

Corporate anthropologists conduct market research to study consumer patterns that aren't obvious with statistical or survey methods. FAQs


