<u>Discussion/Action</u> Resolution 22-03, W. Argent Road Right-of- Way Phase 3	Resolution 22-03 was presented to the Board for consideration. Phase 3 will take place between the freeway exit and Saraceno Way. If approved by the Board, this resolution would grant the City of Pasco a permanent right-of-way across and under a portion of CBC property running parallel to Argent Road. In addition, it would grant temporary construction easement during the West Argent Road improvement project. The construction will begin in early 2023 and be completed by end of 2023.	Trustee Jackson moved and Trustee Page seconded a motion to approve Resolution 22-03. Approved by the Board unanimously.
Faculty Senate Bylaws Revision	Faculty Senate Chair, Kristina Wildenborg, presented a Faculty Senate Bylaws Revision to the Board. This revision was approved by the Faculty on June 3 with at least 51% approval. In the revised version, language, terminology and wording were changed to reflect a more accurate account of the actions and responsibilities of Faculty Senate. Three main areas for the Board's consideration were: • Article III – Delegation of Powers to the Senate The statement in this section previously read, "All powers of the Faculty to review and recommend policy statements relevant to faculty and instruction prior to approval, prior to Board action are vested in the Senate, with the exception of any policy that would usurp the authority of the collective bargaining unit, are vested in the Senate." The bolded/highlighted section was removed on the revision. • Article IV – Representation of Faculty Language was added to include the full responsibility of AHE as referenced in RCW 28B.52. • Article VI – Amendment and By-Law Changes Previously, this section of the Faculty By-laws read, "These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote by secret ballot in which at least fifty percent of eligible voting members have participated and concurrence of the President and Board of Trustees after Faculty passage. An amendment is to be presented to the Faculty for discussion at a general Faculty meeting at least one week prior to balloting." The proposed change to this section would read, "These by-laws may be amended or changed. An amendment or change is to be presented to the Faculty for discussion at a general Faculty meeting at least one week prior to balloting. An amendment or by-law change passes when a majority of those who vote are in favor and concurrence of the President is received."	

	Faculty Senate Chair Wildenborg stated the removal of the Board's concurrence in Article VI was because the Board delegates much of their authority to the President. After some discussion by the Board, it was decided to allow non-substantive changes to the Faculty Senate Bylaws, as approved by a Faculty vote, but all substantive changes to the bylaws would continue to come to the Board for concurrence. The Board gave approval of the proposed Faculty Senate Bylaws Revisions, with the amendment of changing Article VI to read, "These by-laws may be amended or changed. An amendment or change is to be presented to the Faculty for discussion at a general Faculty meeting at least one week prior to balloting. An amendment or by-law change passes when a majority of those who vote are in favor and concurrence of the President and Board of Trustees is received."	Trustee Rivas de Bredt moved and Trustee Page seconded a motion to approve the Faculty Senate Bylaws Revision as written with the amendment to Article VI to include concurrence of the President and Board of Trustees for future changes or amendments to the Faculty Senate Bylaws.
