Approval of Minutes	Trustee Siler asked for a correction to the meeting minutes for November 8, 2021. In the <i>Remarks by Board Members</i> section from Trustee Siler, the 11/1 notation incorrectly states the "ACT DEI Committee is currently ad-hoc and will become a formal committee in the summer." The correction should read, "11/1 Attended the ACT DEI Committee. This committee became a formal committee last summer and has officially elected new cochairs." All other meeting minutes for November 8, 2021 were approved as written.	Trustee Harper moved and Trustee Page seconded the motion to approve minutes from November 8, 2021 with the corrections recommended from Trustee Siler. Approved unanimously.
Linkage with Community		
Martin Valadez, Executive Director of Tri- Cities Hispanic Chamber of Commerce	President Woods introduced Martin Valadez stating in addition to his role of Executive Director for the Tri-Cities Hispanic Chamber, he is also the Director for the Tri-Cities Heritage University Campus (located on the CBC Pasco campus), serves on the State Board, is a vaccine clinic partner with CBC and was instrumental in getting Trustee Rivas de Bredt involved with the CBC Strategic Planning process.	Trustee Jackson thanked Martin Valadez and the Tri-Cities Hispanic Chamber of Commerce for their impact on, and contribution to, our community.
	Martin Valadez explained the Tri-Cities Hispanic Chamber works primarily with small Latino owned businesses especially those where English is their second language. The Hispanic Chamber strives to minimize disparities for and within the Latino population. Some of the Hispanic Chamber's events include hosting business luncheons, panels on higher education, a yearly gala event to recognize Latino leaders in our community and a Mariachi Festival during the summer.	
	Over the past year, many of their activities have moved online which have created new challenges. The Hispanic Chamber worked with the Department of Commerce to assist small business owners with application for grants, provided technical assistance to small business owners and gave COVID information to the Latino community. The Hispanic Chamber partnered with CBC to host four vaccine clinics and provided \$50 gift cards to early attendees – 346 individuals were provided vaccinations during these clinics. In addition, the Hispanic Chamber partnered with SuperMex Supermarket, New Hope	

	Church and the Islamic Center to provide Saturday and Sunday vaccine clinics – 3,381 individuals were vaccinated at these weekend clinics.	
Remarks		
By Administration, President	President Woods provided highlights about the new Student Recreation Center (SRC). The construction team is currently waiting on tinted glass for the corners of the building, but all windows should be here and installed by February 2022. The team hopes to gain occupancy by early April so the Athletics Department can host the Hall of Fame dinner in the new facility April 15, 2022. Demolition of the old recreation building will start after occupancy of the new SRC.	
	CBC's submission to the Aspen Institute will be completed December 13, 2021. President Woods gave a huge thank you to Dr. Jason Engle, Dr. Josh Ellis, Eleanor Schroeder and Dr. Michael Lee for their work during the application process.	
	The budget process is beginning and data from a number of sources will be evaluated. The Student Enrollment Management (SEM) group reports the most current enrollment numbers show an 11% decline, which shows signs of improvement from previous reports. SEM will share more data and information at the January 2022 Board meeting. Dr. Engle shared that over 200 CBC employees participated in a listening session sharing ideas for the Spring schedule and ways to improve student enrollment.	
	The capital project submission was due this week to the state board. CBC is requesting a new Ag/STEM building with the working title of CASA; Center for Applied Science and Agriculture. This will be a long-term project of six to ten years.	
	President Woods, Trustee Jackson and Trustee Rivas de Bredt attended the Legislative Luncheon hosted at Walla Walla Community College. There were four legislators in attendance giving CBC and WWCC the opportunity to share their priorities for the upcoming legislative session.	
	Monday, January 17, 2022, will be the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration event on the CBC Pasco campus. It will be hybrid with limited in person attendance and a virtual viewing feature. President Woods asked the trustees to make suggestions for any invitees.	
	The newest ctcLink milestone was the Sprint 1 start during the week of December 6, 2021. Things went well and valuable lessons were learned for possible improvements in processes.	
	CBC student Richard Kemp was selected as a finalist for the Transforming Lives Awards coming up on Monday, January 24, 2022 in Olympia. Richard was asked to be a keynote speaker at the dinner by the ACT Committee and will be invited to the January Board meeting to share his story and successes.	
By CEO, Foundation	Erin Fishburn gave an update of Foundation activities: November donor lunches with student recipients received positive feedback, year-end holiday cards and cookie platters went out last week and the Foundation Board celebrated with a small holiday event to rebuild relationships in person. Upcoming events include the opening of the new scholarship cycle on January 1 and closing on February 28. Scholarships will be reviewed in March and awarded in June 2022.	Trustee Jackson and Trustee Siler are willing to be scholarship reviewers for the new cycle.

Cash Balance Report Variance Report

Mission Fulfillment Report (Spring Update)

VP for Administrative Services, Eduardo Rodriguez, provided highlights from the Cash Balance and Variance Report. VP Rodriguez noted the Cash Balance Report shows a \$4.8 million drop from last month – this is due to the \$3.6 million payment for the SRC and \$2.7 million for financial aid. CBC will be reimbursed by the state for most of these expenditures. The State Auditors' Office reached out to CBC for a review sometime in the first quarter of 2022. Within the next month or so, CBC will reach out to the Board of Trustees for participation in the entry interview process.

Dr. Jason Engle, presented a Power Point presentation and provided additional mission fulfillment information in Exhibit F. His report is the fourth in the series established three years ago, tracking outcomes with emphasis on degree completion from the CBC Mission. Dr. Engle acknowledged this report put all the data together making broad brush statements with areas for variability.

Observation #1: 2020-21 saw a rebound in completion rates; 2020 was at 30.9% and 2021 at 34.2%. Hispanic students were at 30.7% overall in 2021 and non-Hispanic students were at 37.2%.

Observation #2: 2020-21 saw continued strength in first year credits (30 college level credit attainment); 2020 was at 37.4% and 2021 at 42.8%. Hispanic students were at 38.0% in 2021 and non-Hispanic students were at 46.5%.

Observation #3: 2020-21 saw a sharp increase in Math and English gateway course completion; 2020 was at 21.6% for Math and 2021 at 31.2%, while English was at 27.1% in 2020 and 34.4% in 2021. Hispanic students were at 26.0% for Math and 31.6% for English in 2021, while non-Hispanic students were at 35.2% for Math and 38.9% for English in 2021.

Observation #4: Retention and re-enrollment numbers have likely been affected by COVID and was highly visible initially, especially in Professional/Technical retention. Declines have occurred, but have been more modest than initially expected. Despite lower retention, credit accumulation has been strong. Longer term impacts are still unfolding, but we don't yet see the kind of drastic performance problems that could have resulted.

Observation #5a: Transitional Studies enrollment dropped 27.5% in 2020-21, easily the largest drop in any targeted population at CBC. While likely not the sole contributor to three-year progress (in hours and retention), enrollment has played a role with over a year of mostly online instruction.

Observation #5b: Transitional Studies to college transition – post high school enrollment gains in 2019-20 were not sustained in the pandemic environment. Again, enrollment challenges with this population plus naturally high population variability due to small numbers (169 in 2020-21) may exacerbate any existing challenges here.

Observation #6a: Are our gains in 2020-21 due to COVID – probably not based on comparisons between CBC and SBCTC percentages of students meeting target for 3-year completion and 30 credits earned during one year.

POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-8

POLICY TITLE: COMMUNICATION AND SUPPORT TO THE BOARD

The President, with sufficient and relevant support and assistance from the College Leadership team (Vice-Presidents and Deans), shall not fail to proactively communicate, provide information and counsel to the Board in a timely manner.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Fail to submit Monitoring and Performance data reports required by the Board in a timely, accurate and understandable format that directly addresses provisions of the Board policies being monitored.
- 2. Let the Board be unaware of relevant trends, anticipated adverse media coverage, material external and internal changes, and particularly changes in assumptions upon which any Board policy has previously been established.
- 3. Fail to advise the Board if, in the President's opinion, the Board is not in compliance with its own policies, and particularly in the case of Board behavior which is detrimental to the work relationship between the Board and President.
- 4. Deprive the Board of as many staff and external points of view, issues and options as needed for fully-informed Board choices and decisions.
- 5. Present information in unnecessarily complex or lengthy format such that it fails to clearly differentiate between monitoring, Board decision preparation and other designated subject matter.
- 6. Withhold from the Board the support needed for its official functioning and communications.
- 7. Favor any Board Member of Members above the Board as a whole, except when fulfilling individual Board member requests for information.
- 8. Fail to report in a timely manner an actual or anticipated non-compliance with any Board policy.
- 9. Neglect to supply topics and/or issues that may need to be processed in its "required approval agenda." Such topics and issues are those delegated to the President, yet required by law or contract to be Board-approved, along with monitoring assurance pertaining thereto.

POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-9 POLICY TITLE: EMERGENCY EXECUTIVE SUCCESSION

To protect the Board from sudden loss of Chief Executive services, the President shall not have fewer than two other executives familiar with Board and Chief Executive issues and processes.



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-10 POLICY TITLE: TENURE

The Board of Trustees reserves the authority to grant tenure, extend the tenure and review process for probationary faculty, and dismiss tenured faculty at Columbia Basin College. Additionally the Board reserves the authority to renew or not renew contracts for probationary faculty, and to dismiss probationary faculty.

Accordingly, the President will not:

- 1. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board to grant or deny tenure to faculty.
- 2. Fail to submit notice of sufficient cause for tenured faculty member dismissal through dismissal review proceedings for Board consideration and decision.
- 3. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board for the renewal or non-renewal of contracts for probationary faculty.
- 4. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board to issue the final order to dismiss probationary faculty.

BOARD POLICIES

POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-1

POLICY TITLE: GENERAL EXECUTIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Board of Trustees is responsible for following the adopted Carver Governance Model and Process. The President is held accountable for organizational compliance – ensuring and allowing any practice, activity, decision or situation that is lawful, prudent and not in violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics, and fit within the provisions set forth in the State Board for Community & Technical College, Office of Financial Management and Columbia Basin College policies, and/or take into account any executive order of the Governor of the State of Washington.



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-2

POLICY TITLE: TREATMENT OF COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND STUDENTS

With respect to staff interaction with community members and students or those applying to be students, the President shall set and maintain organizational expectations and norms that ensure their safe treatment, respect, dignity, confidentiality and privacy.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Use application forms or procedures that elicit unnecessary information or violates confidentiality and privacy.
- 2. Use methods of collecting, reviewing, transmitting or storing client information that fail to protect against improper access to the information elicited.
- 3. Fail to inform the community members and students about what may be expected and what may not be expected from the service offered.
- 4. Withhold a grievance process from students who believe that they have not been accorded a reasonable interpretation of rights established pursuant to this Policy.
- 5. Operate without written procedures which clarify the rules for students.
- 6. Make false claims or withhold required information about any programs, services, or cost of attendance.



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-3 POLICY TITLE: TREATMENT OF EMPLOYEES

With respect to the treatment of paid and volunteer staff, the President may not cause or allow conditions which are unlawful, unfair or undignified.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Operate without written personnel procedures, which clarify personnel rules for staff, provide for effective handling of grievances, and protect against wrongful conditions e.g., nepotism, grossly preferential treatment for personal reasons.
- 2. Discriminate against any staff member for expressing an ethical dissent.
- 3. Hinder or prevent, restrict the exercise of academic freedom.
- 4. Hinder or prevent employees from using established grievance procedures.

POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-4 POLICY TITLE: COMPENSATION

With respect to employment, compensation to employees, consultants, contract workers and volunteers, the President shall not fail to promote adherence to nor fail to ensure fiscal integrity and good public image.

The Board of Trustees reserves the sole authority to change the compensation and benefits for the President.

The President shall not promise or imply permanent or guaranteed employment to anyone in the College.

Exhibit H



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-5 POLICY TITLE: TREATMENT OF ASSET PROTECTION

Through operational compliance and leadership, the President shall not allow assets to be unprotected, inadequately maintained nor put at risk.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Unnecessarily expose the organization, its Board or staff to claims of liability.
- 2. Fail to protect intellectual property, information and files from vulnerability, loss or significant damage.
- 3. Receive, process or disburse funds under controls that are insufficient to meet the Auditor's standards.
- 4. Jeopardize nor damage the organization's public image or credibility, particularly in ways that would hinder its accomplishment of mission.



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-6
POLICY TITLE: FINANCIAL PLANNING

Fiscal planning shall not deviate materially with the Board's *Ends* policies nor risk fiscal jeopardy. Accordingly, the President **shall** not cause or allow financial planning which:

- 1. Plans the expenditure in any fiscal year or more funds than are conservatively projected to be received in that period, plus accumulated reserve.
- 2. Contains insufficient and unnecessary information that limits or restricts credible projection of revenues and expenses, separation of capital and operational items, cash flow and disclosure of planning assumptions.
- 3. Limits or restricts sufficient funds for Board prerogatives during the year as set forth in the Board's annual activity and travel plans.



POLICY TYPE: EXECUTIVE LIMITATIONS EL-7

POLICY TITLE: FIDUCIARY RESPONSIBILITY / FINANCIAL CONDITION AND ACTIVITY

The Board of Trustees reserves the authority to set policies for and review the Financials and associated status for the College at a frequency determined by the Board. With respect to the Board's actual and continuous fiduciary responsibility, and the College's financial health, the President shall fail to promote fiscal integrity and shall avoid material deviation from Board-approved priorities.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Expend more funds that have been approved by the Board (via policy decisions) in the fiscal year, unless there has been Board's approval to do otherwise.
- 2. Expend more funds than have been received in the fiscal year to date, plus the accumulated Reserve, unless the Board-approved debt guideline is met.
- 3. Incur debt in an amount greater than which can be repaid by certain and otherwise unencumbered revenues within the current year, nor can be repaid from account specifically established for such purpose.
- 4. Jeopardize fiscal integrity by expending College funds in a manner that will result in a zero nor negative fund balance at the close of the fiscal year.
- 5. Fail to settle payroll and debts in a timely manner.
- 6. Allow tax payments or other government-ordered payments or filings to be overdue and inaccurately filed.
- 7. Acquire, encumber nor dispose of real property without Board approval.
- 8. Fail to aggressively pursue receivables after a reasonable grace period.
- 9. Fail to provide to the Board, at their designated frequency, reports on the College's current financial condition that will continually enhance the Board's ability to meet its fiduciary responsibility.
- 10. Accept gifts or grants that are not in the best interest of the College, and not obligate the College to make future expenditures using funds other than those created by the gift or grant without Board approval.



- 11. Failtomaintain an Operating Reserve to a level approved by the Board, to provide for such items as, but not limited to:
 - a. Current Operations

Reserve of 2 months operating expenditures consisting of the general operating budget funds

- i. 001 State General (appropriation),
- ii. Running Start portion of 145 Grants and Contracts,
- iii. 148 Dedicated Local (fees),
- iv. 149 Local General (tuition)
- b. Emergencies

Reserve to provide for unforeseen natural or manmade disasters to support business continuity and recovery actions.

- c. Unplanned Capital Repair & Replacement
 - Reserve to cover the largest system or component failure that might occur in or outside the biennial, legislatively funded, capital repair and minor improvement funding. Examples include roofs, HVAC, and electric, water, and sewer systems.
- d. Real Estate Debt
 - Reserve to provide funding for real estate acquisition and debt service needs not provided for by State resources.
- e. Planned Future Operations
 - Reserve for future new program offerings, which have been recognized by the campus as appropriate and within the educational mission of the College. The Reserve will recognize each specific project and provide an allocated amount for each.
- f. Capital Facilities Projects
 - Reserve to provide for capital facility projects not covered by or to supplement State resources.

The President will not fail to annually recommend to the Board an amount to be set aside to maintain this fund, which is subject to approval by the Board.
