WHW began in the 1990's to empower women and children to create healthy families and a vibrant community. WHW has funded \$3.5 million to agencies and projects including programs at CBC. WHW grants for funding of CBC programs include: 2023 – the CBC library family student area, 2022 – the CBC Foundation Reentry Gap Funding Program, 2021 – the CBC Foundation scholarship support for elementary education, 2020 – the CBC Foundation emerging needs funding for women in Trio/Student Support Services, and 2017 – the CBC Foundation Worker Retraining Program. At the 2023 annual fundraising event for WHW, President Woods presented an overview of CBC and CBC co-hosted a student athlete pre-event featuring this year's keynote speaker, Joanne "Coach P" McCallie, a Hall of Fame NCAA basketball coach and mental health advocate. Exhibit E: Mission Fulfillment Report (Spring Update)	Dean for Organizational Learning, Jason Engle, provided the spring update of the Mission Fulfillment Report. CBC saw a gradual increase for 2022-2023 in on-campus engagement and classes, and an increase of enrollment of over 6% annual FTE (over all enrollments). Significant investment in institution wide equity work has begun with dialogue around <i>Inclusivo: Hawks Soaring Together</i> , our equity-centered strategic plan.	

#### Notable Strengths (+): Retention, notably the +10% gain in fall-to-fall retention for Hispanic students. Sustained progress in 30 credit completion, math completion, and to a lesser extent, course success. Notable Opportunities (-): • First-year college level English completion has not met the expectations we might have had for sustained gain since the start of DSP and remains an area of concern. Several newer efforts hold promise here, which are headlined by our work with English 101 supports in I-BEST and writing center activity in the Academic Success Center. Course success "on track" for first year Hispanic students (and all students this year) is a foundational measure that had made progress in recent years, but the long-term achievement gaps persist. Transitional Studies came back particularly strong in enrollment in 2022-23, but the first-year measures have not come back to pre-pandemic levels yet. In addition, longer term 3 Year measures, which are most reflective of first year performance, are still largely below their pre-pandemic levels. CBC's overall rating for the 2022-23 academic year is 3.27, an overall level of performance that is maintaining compared to 3.14 in 2020-21 and 3.11 in 2021-22. Goal #1 – Transfer or completion by Year 3 is 33.4% overall, up from 32.5% last year, and not appreciably different than our last five years. This year's results are from the 2020-21 entering student cohort, our first "pandemic" cohort. Goal #2 - 30 college level credit attainment (Year 1) is 45.1% overall, up from 43.5% last year, and up appreciably over six years. The Hispanic/Non-Hispanic gap, like in completion/transfer, is consistent over that same time. Goal #3a - College level English (Year 1) is 34.5% overall, slightly up from 34.1% last year, holding last year's increase. The Hispanic/Non-Hispanic gap is similar in size to other measures in size at around 7%. Goal #3b - College level math (Year 1) is 32.8% overall, down from 34.7% last year. The Hispanic/Non-Hispanic gap remains, similar to our other goal measures at below 7%. 

The President, with sufficient and relevant support and assistance from the College Leadership team (Vice-Presidents and Deans), shall not fail to proactively communicate, provide information and counsel to the Board in a timely manner.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Fail to submit Monitoring and Performance data reports required by the Board in a timely, accurate and understandable format that directly addresses provisions of the Board policies being monitored.
- 2. Let the Board be unaware of relevant trends, anticipated adverse media coverage, material external and internal changes, and particularly changes in assumptions upon which any Board policy has previously been established.
- 3. Fail to advise the Board if, in the President's opinion, the Board is not in compliance with its own policies, particularly in the case of Board behavior which is detrimental to the work relationship between the Board and President.
- 4. Deprive the Board of as many staff and external points of view, issues and options as needed for fully-informed Board choices and decisions.
- 5. Present information in unnecessarily complex or lengthy format such that it fails to clearly differentiate between monitoring, Board decision preparation and other designated subject matter.
- 6. Withhold from the Board the support needed for its official functioning and communications.
- 7. Favor any Board Member or Members above the Board as a whole, except when fulfilling individual Board member requests for information.
- 8. Fail to report in a timely manner an actual or anticipated non-compliance with any Board policy.
- 9. Neglect to supply topics and/or issues that may need to be processed in the Board's "required approval agenda." Such topics and issues are those delegated to the President, yet required by law or contract to be Board-approved, along with monitoring assurance pertaining thereto.

The Board of Trustees reserves the authority to grant tenure, extend the tenure and review process for probationary faculty, and dismiss tenured faculty at Columbia Basin College. Additionally the Board reserves the authority to renew or not renew contracts for probationary faculty, and to dismiss probationary faculty. for tenure as referenced in GP-3, Board Job Description.

Accordingly, the President shall not:

- 1. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board to grant or deny tenure to faculty.
- 2. Fail to submit notice of sufficient cause for tenured faculty member dismissal through dismissal review proceedings for Board consideration and decision.
- 3. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board for the renewal or non-renewal of contracts for probationary faculty.
- 4. Fail to submit recommendations to the Board to issue the final order to dismiss probationary faculty.
